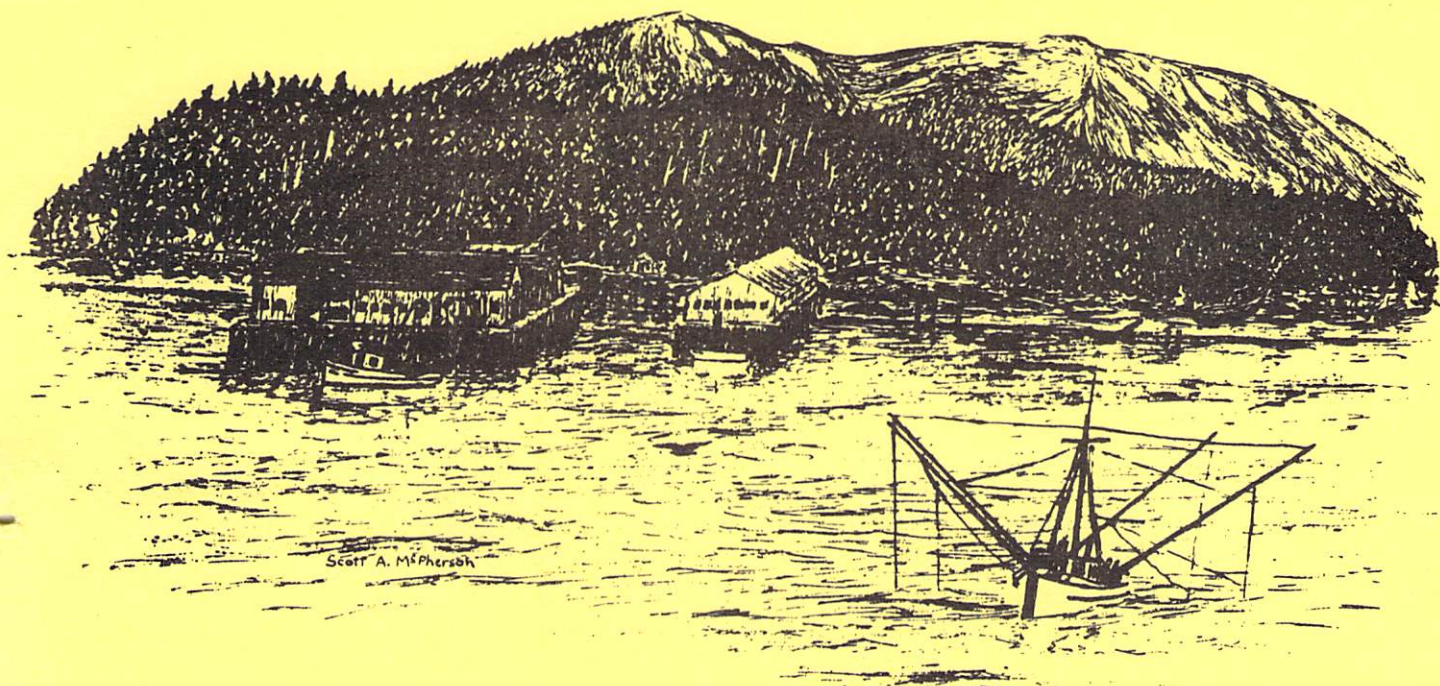

ANNUAL REPORT

Introduction

The Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission annual report addresses three categories of Commission activity during the 1979 calendar year. These areas are: (1) the continuing administration of the limited entry law (AS 16.43) in Alaskan fisheries; (2) legislative recommendations; (3) court decisions handed down and cases pending involving the Commission; and special projects.

1979 COMMERCIAL FISHERIES LICENSING

During the 1979 calendar year the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission (CFEC) issued 28,728 entry and interim-use permits totaling \$2,996,920 in gross revenues. In accordance with AS 23.35.060, \$146,289 was transferred to the Fisherman's Fund, leaving a net contribution of \$2,850,622 to the General Fund. This represents a 20.7% increase in the number of licenses issued and a 23.5% increase in revenue over 1978.

Vessel licensing during 1979 also increased from 14,500 to 15,683 vessels. This 8.1% increase generated \$313,660 in revenue to the General Fund, bringing CFEC's total 1979 General Fund contributions to \$3,164,282.

CONTINUING CFEC PROGRAMS

New Limited Entry Fisheries In 1979

During 1979 the Commission held hearings on proposals to limit the salmon hand troll fishery and the Prince William Sound roe herring gill net fishery. The Commission moved to adopt a maximum number of 2,150 permits for the salmon hand troll fishery, and 25 permits for the Prince William Sound roe herring gill net fishery in late December. Both sets of regulations became effective in early 1980.

Permit Transfers

Since 1975 the Commission has conducted a voluntary survey of all fishermen transferring or acquiring permits. The purpose of the survey is to monitor permit prices and analyze transfer trends. In 1978 the legislature authorized the Department of Commerce and Economic Development to make loans to Alaska residents for permit purchases. This legislation enables fishermen to borrow up to 90% of the appraised value of the permit, using the permit itself as collateral.

Appraisals are established by CFEC for the Department of Commerce and Economic Development based on data obtained from the survey. Since it is imperative that these values be as accurate and timely as possible, CFEC adopted a regulation requiring all transferees to submit the transfer survey. Results of the new survey will not be available until 1980. Results of the former survey are summarized in Table 3. Table 4 summarizes the number of loans financed by the Department of Commerce during 1979.

Optimum Numbers of Permits

According to AS 16.43.290, the optimum number of entry permits is the number which will: (1) maintain an economically healthy fishery that will result in a reasonable average rate of return to participants; (2) promote an orderly and efficient commercial harvest consistent with sound fishery management techniques; and (3) avoid serious economic hardship to those currently participating in the fishery, considering alternative economic opportunities reasonably available to them.

To date optimum numbers have not been established in any of the fisheries which are presently limited. Staffing and funding problems, as well as lack of support for a buy-back program, slowed research in this area during 1979. A 6/79 report on optimum numbers submitted by John B. Martin, contains the latest developments in proposed optimum number methodology, and a review of previous CFEC research.

LEGISLATION

In 1979 legislation was enacted that provided for the issuance of special harvest area permits and allowed for point pooling on certain applications. The special harvest area permits authorized by AS 16.43.335-343 may be used by the operator of a non-profit hatchery or his designated agent to harvest salmon in an area designated a special harvest area by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game. Fish caught under a special harvest area permit may be sold if the money is used to meet the operating expenses of the hatchery.

AS 16.43.250(d) allows an individual who applied for two or more entry permits for the same specific fishery resource and the same specific gear type but who failed to receive a permit, to "pool" the points from the applications and receive a permit in the fishery for which he is most qualified.

LITIGATION

Three State Supreme Court decisions rendered since the last annual report are of great importance to the Commission. In Yunker v CFEC, the court upheld the Commission's point system as reasonable and bearing a fair and substantial relationship to the object of the Limited Entry Act.

In CFEC v Templeton, the Court ruled that the Commission interpreted 20 AAC 05.630(b)(2) too narrowly by requiring the holding of a gear license before an individual could receive income dependence points under a "special showing". The Court held that a non-gear license holding member of a fishing partnership who owned and operated

gear could receive consideration under 20 AAC 05.630(b)(2) and possibly receive income dependence points. The potential impact of this decision in terms of additional permits issued is as yet undeterminable.

CFEC v Apokedak is the most significant case concerning the Commission since Isakson v Rickey. In Isakson the Court held that individuals who fished as gear license holders for the first time in 1973 and 1974 in the original 19 salmon fisheries placed under limitation should be allowed to apply. Some interpreted the Court's language in Isakson as stating that the requirements for eligibility to apply for an entry permit were unconstitutional. This interpretation was a basis for the constitutional challenge in Apokedak. The Court, however, upheld the Limited Entry Act in a unanimous opinion.

This past year, the Commission successfully defended many cases in Superior Court. Of the few in which the Commission was not upheld, the most important was Melton v CFEC. In that case the Court held that even though an applicant failed to request an administrative hearing after the initial point verification, he should have received another opportunity to request a hearing after a subsequent point award.

At present there is a considerable number of cases pending against the Commission in Superior Court. The Commission is confident that due to the quality of its legal representation and the affirmation of the Limited Entry Act in Apokedak this workload will be reduced considerably in the near future.

SPECIAL PROJECTS

Research on Upper Yukon Salmon Fisheries

SCR 22 and HB 290 directed the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission to obtain a roll of all individuals who had operated gear in Upper Yukon commercial fisheries since 1960, but who had not been issued a permit. These directions implied that "commercial" was to include barter and sale of fresh, smoked, and dried fish products. A gear license or fishwheel registration were not prerequisites for inclusion on the roll.

Due to the broad nature of the covered categories, the roll could not be produced from existing records. For this reason, the legislative staff of the Upper Yukon Subcommittee and the Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission agreed that a survey-research project was the best way to obtain the requested information. With the aid of the Tanana Chiefs Conference, CFEC staff conducted on-site surveys during the 1979 summer fishing season. A description of this research can be found in Participation in the Commercial Salmon Fisheries of the Upper Yukon, a CFEC report to the Eleventh Legislature. Data from the survey has been placed on computer tape so that it can readily be utilized as an information source by the legislature.
