

gear. The numbers of the CFEC purse seine or net gear permits which will be fished on the vessel must also be provided. When the vessel is registered for a salmon net area, the area will be imprinted on the vessel license receipt card. If the vessel is being registered for the area for the first time, a small rectangular area decal will also be issued. The decal is to be attached to the metal ADF&G number plate. New area decals will not be issued in subsequent years, as long as the vessel remains registered for the same area.

Can the salmon net area be changed once the vessel has been registered?

If the vessel has been registered for a salmon net area but has not yet fished in that registration area, a "Vessel License Change of Information" form must be submitted along with the current year vessel license receipt.

Once the vessel has fished in the initial area of salmon registration, it cannot be registered for another area unless there is authorization from the Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, or his designee. Authorization may be allowed only if a vessel has been lost, destroyed or suffered extensive mechanical breakdown, or if the vessel operator has suffered a serious illness or injury, or death.

Can sport fishing be done from commercially licensed vessels?

There may be restrictions. You should consult with ADF&G prior to participation. Vessels must be licensed with ADF&G for Guided Sport fishing.

When does a vessel have to be registered for commercial trolling?

Commercial hand and power troll vessels must be registered for trolling prior to participating in the fishery. Once the vessel has been registered for commercial trolling, there may be restrictions on its use for sport fishing. Contact ADF&G Division of Sport Fish for further information.

To register for trolling, check the appropriate box on the vessel license application form and indicate the date you



want your troll registration to be effective. This may be the current date if you intend to start trolling immediately, or it may be later in the year if you only fish the summer season and intend to use the boat for sport fishing in the meantime.

Can foreign vessels be licensed in Alaska?

A vessel that is documented in a foreign country, cannot be licensed to fish commercially in Alaskan waters or the Federal waters of the EEZ, or to process fish, unless approved by the Governor. However, a 1989 opinion from the Attorney General's office determined that foreign vessels may be licensed to operate as tenders or packers, provided they take product on board only in established ports, harbors, roadsteads, and not at sea. Foreign vessels which are used in fisheries occurring outside Alaska waters, primarily in Canada, may obtain Alaska vessel licenses in order to deliver catch to processors in Alaska, but they must clear customs when entering Alaska waters. For more detailed information, contact the Commission. Foreign vessels under 5 net tons can be licensed in Alaska but must have AK numbers issued from your local DMV office. For information regarding foreign vessels over 5 net tons, contact the United States Coast Guard at 1-800-799-8362.

Commercial Fishing Vessel Licenses



Commercial Fisheries Entry Commission

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What kinds of vessels have to be licensed for commercial fishing?

Vessels used for commercial fishing or related activities must be licensed by the Commission. This includes fishing vessels, tenders, packers, processing and transporter vessels. Guided Charter vessels must be licensed with the Alaska Department of Fish and Game(ADF&G).

Are there any exceptions to the vessel license requirement?

Set out in AS 16.05.495, a vessel used exclusively for the commercial capture of salmon in commercial management areas that include state waters between the latitude of Point Romanof and Cape Newenham and state water surrounding Nunivak Island, or at a set net site, is exempt from the licensing requirements of AS 16.05.490

How do I get a vessel license?

A "Commercial Fishing Vessel License" application form must be completed and submitted with the appropriate fee to the Commission. Vessel license applications available from the Commission, from local ADF&G offices or from our web site at: www.cfec.state.ak.us

Who can apply for the license?

The vessel license application form may be completed by the vessel owner or an authorized agent of the owner, such as the skipper operating the vessel. However, the correct name and address of the owner must be provided on the form, as well as social security number and date of birth, if applicable. Once the vessel is licensed for the year, it may be operated by anyone who holds the appropriate permits.

How much does a vessel license cost?

Vessel license fees range from \$24 to \$900, depending upon the overall length of the vessel. Vessel license fees are not refundable, even if the vessel is not used in the fishery. Vessel license applicants receiving a new ADF&G number, must also submit a one time fee of \$30.00 for the initial issuance of the ADF&G triangle metal plate.

What does a vessel license consist of?

If the vessel is being licensed for the first time, the license will include a triangular metal plate with the permanent ADF&G number assigned to the vessel. Whether it is a new license or a renewal, it will also include a triangular decal showing the year for which the license is valid and a computer printed vessel license receipt. If the vessel is used to fish salmon with net gear, a salmon net area registration decal is also required.

What happens if the vessel license sticker or receipt card is lost?

If the vessel license sticker, metal plate, or license receipt is lost, a replacement may be obtained by completing a "Request for Duplicate License" form, available from the Commission, local ADF&G offices or from our website at: www.cfec.state.ak.us On this form, check the items to be replaced. There is a \$20 fee for a duplicate metal plate, and a \$20 fee to replace the annual sticker and/or license receipt.



If a vessel is bought or sold, how is ownership changed in the records?

If a vessel is bought, and it has not been licensed for the current year, the new owner may simply complete a "Commercial Vessel License Application" form. Ownership will be changed automatically, as long as all necessary information has been provided .

If the vessel is already licensed for the year, the new owner should obtain the current vessel license receipt from the seller. This should be submitted with a completed "Vessel

License Change of Information" form. The form may be validated by a Commission employee, ADF&G employee, or the Alaska Wildlife Troopers, so that the new owner may retain a copy to use as a temporary license while waiting for the new license to arrive in the mail.

If I buy a new boat, can I keep my old boat's ADF&G number to use on the new boat?

No. The ADF&G number is **permanently** assigned to a particular vessel and is **not** transferable.

Does the vessel need to have an AK registration or documentation number in order to be licensed?

The vessel license may be issued even if the vessel does not yet have an AK registration number or US Coast Guard Documentation number, but the Commission should be notified of the number as soon as possible. All vessels powered by a minimum of 10 hp used on navigable waters, which are **not** documented vessels, are required to have AK registration numbers which are issued at your local DMV office. Vessels over 5 net tons are issued a US Coast Guard Documentation number.

Is the vessel license all that is needed in order for the vessel to be fished in Alaska?

Many fisheries have additional licensing or registration requirements. Check with local ADF&G offices for additional requirements.

Once the vessel is licensed, can it be used in all Fisheries in Alaska?

Many fisheries in Alaska have area registration requirements which restrict the use of the vessel to a particular area of the State. For instance, salmon purse seine or net gear vessels may only be used to fish salmon in one administrative area each year. Likewise, vessels may only be used to harvest roe herring in one superexclusive area during certain months of the year.

How is a vessel registered for a salmon net area?

The license application contains a space to designate the one area in which the vessel will fish salmon with net
